500 Neal McCoy- Wink

released in April 1994 as the second single from his album *No Doubt About It*. Also the second consecutive Number One from that album,

499 Willie Nelson/Waylon Jennings- The Year That Clayton Delaney Died

written and recorded by American <u>country music</u> artist <u>Tom T. Hall</u>. Waylon and Willie's version is from 1982.

498 Sugarland- Something More

released in April 2005 as the second single from their debut album *Twice the Speed of Life*. Like its predecessor "Baby Girl", "Something More" was a number 2 hit.

497 Carrie Underwood- Undo It

released as an official single on May 24, 2010. The song is the third single from Underwood's third studio album, <u>Play On</u>. Underwood performed the song at the 2010 <u>American</u> <u>Idol</u> finale, as well as at the 2010 CMT Music Awards.

496 Restless Heart- The Bluest Eyes in Texas

released in May 1988 as the lead single from Restless Heart's album <u>Big Dreams in a Small Town</u>. Song co-writers Robbins and Stephenson later joined with <u>Henry Paul</u> to form the country group BlackHawk in 1992.

495 Ray Charles- Busted

Nashville songwriter Harlan Howard wrote this in 1962. It was originally recorded by Johnny Cash that year, but it became a hit in 1963 Charles did a soul version.

494 Billy Currington- Hey Girl

released in March 2013 as the first single from Currington's 2013 album <u>We Are</u> Tonight. The song became Currington's seventh number one hit.

493 Travis Tritt- T-R-O-U-B-L-E

written by <u>Jerry Chesnut</u> and recorded by <u>Elvis Presley</u> in March 1975. his song was recorded in 1992 by <u>Travis Tritt</u>. It was the third single released from his 1992 album of the <u>same</u> name. It peaked at #13

492 Conway Twitty- You've Never Been This Far Before

released in July 1973 as the second single and title track from the album *You've Never Been This*. The song was controversial at the time of its release, with several radio stations banning it, due to what were considered by some to be overly sexual lyrics.

491 Zac Brown Band- Highway Twenty Ride

released in November 2009 as the fourth <u>single</u> from the band's 2009 album <u>The Foundation</u>. It is the band's third Number One on the U.S. country singles chart. Wyatt Durette was inspired to write "Highway 20 Ride" while driving along <u>Interstate 20</u> between <u>Atlanta</u>, <u>Georgia</u> and the Georgia/South Carolina state line in <u>Augusta</u>, <u>Georgia</u> to drop off his son, Wyatt IV, so that his mother could pick him up.

490 Thomas Rhett- Crash And Burn

the lead single to Rhett's second studio album, <u>Tangled Up</u>, and was released to country radio on April 27, 2015. Prior to the song's release, Rhett admitted that he was worried about the feedback from fans about the new single because of its <u>pop</u>- and <u>R&B</u>-influenced sound.

489 Dixie Chicks- Wide Open Spaces

released in August 1998 as the third single and title track from the band's album <u>Wide Open Spaces. In The song hit number one. Susan Gibson</u> wrote the song's first lyrics in 1993, on her first visit back home after leaving for <u>forestry school</u> at the <u>University of Montana</u>.

488 Brad Paisley/Alabama- Old Alabama

released in March 2011 as second single from Paisley's 2011 album *This Is Country Music*. When writing the song, Paisley thought that the bridge to Alabama's 1982 single "Mountain Music" would fit well with the song. Instead of sampling that song, he asked Alabama band members Randy Owen, Jeff Cook and Teddy Gentry to join him in the studio and record a piece of it.

487 Kid Rock/Sheryl Crow- Picture

released on November 12, 2002, as the fourth single and ninth track from Kid Rock's 2001 album <u>Cocky</u>. The original recording on the album is performed by the song's writers. Rock rerecorded the song for radio with <u>Allison Moorer</u> because Atlantic was initially unable to get the rights from Crow's label to release the album version as a single. When the Moorer version was released, some radio stations began playing the Crow version instead, The song was a commercial and critical success and was nominated for Vocal Event of The Year at the 2003 <u>Country Music Association</u> awards.

486 Trisha Yearwood-XXX'S and OOO'S

released in June 1994 as the lead single from her album <u>Thinkin' About You</u>. The song became her second number-one hit on the US country charts ^[1] and her first since "<u>She's in Love with the Boy</u>" in 1991. It is the theme song to her <u>Food Network</u> show <u>Trisha's Southern Kitchen</u>.

485 Gary Stewart- She's Acting Single

released in March 1975 as the third and final single from the album <u>Out of Hand</u>. The song was Stewart's third top ten hit on the country chart and his only song to hit number one.

484 Lady Antebellum- Bartender

the song was released to country radio by <u>Capitol Nashville</u> on May 12, 2014, as the lead single from the group's sixth studio album, <u>747</u>, The music video premiered on the <u>Today Show</u> on June 19, 2014. It co-stars model <u>Kate Upton</u> and <u>Veep/Arrested</u>
<u>Development</u> actor Tony Hale.

483 Waylon Jennings- Rainy Day Woman

released in December 1974 as the second single from the album <u>The Ramblin' Man</u>. The song reached number 2.

482 Shania Twain- If You're Not in It for Love, I'm Outta Here

released in November 1995 as the fourth single from her second studio album, <u>The Woman in Me</u> (1995). Written by <u>Mutt Lange</u> and Twain, the song became her second number-one hit at country radio.

481 Darius Rucker- Come Back Song

The song, co-written by Rucker and Nashville songwriters <u>Casey Beathard</u> and <u>Chris Stapleton</u>, was released to country music radio in July 2010 as the lead single from Rucker's second album of country music *Charleston*, *SC* 1966.

480 Jerry Reed- She Got the Goldmine

released in June 1982 as the third and final single from the album, *The Man with the Golden Thumb*. A satire on <u>divorce</u>, the song was Reed's third and final No. 1 country hit in the late summer of 1982, and one of his signature tunes.

479 Chris Young- I Can Take It From There

released in October 2012 as the fourth and final single from his 2011 album <u>Neon</u>. The song was written by Young, <u>Rhett Akins</u> and <u>Ben Hayslip</u>. peaked at number 4 on the chart in April 2013, making it Young's first Top 10 country single to miss the Number One spot.

478 Garth Brooks- Standing Outside the Fire

released in December 1993 as the third single from his album <u>In Pieces</u>. The song also appears on <u>The Hits</u>, The Limited Series, <u>Double Live</u>, and <u>The Ultimate Hits</u>. It reached number 3 on the Billboard Country Charts in 1994. It was also a success internationally and reached the top 30 of the <u>UK singles chart</u>, a rare feat for a country singer at the time.

477 John Anderson- I'm Just An Old Chunk of Coal (But I'm Gonna Be a Diamond Someday) written and originally recorded by <u>Billy Joe Shaver</u>. American <u>country music</u> artist <u>John Anderson</u> released the song in March 1981 as the first single from his album <u>John Anderson 2</u>. The song reached number 4.

476 Florida Georgia Line/Luke Bryan- This Is How We Roll

the fifth and final single from Florida Georgia Line's debut studio album, <u>Here's to the Good Times</u>, although it is only included on the 2013 *This Is How We Roll* re-release. <u>Cole Swindell</u> assisted the artists in writing the song. A remix, featuring <u>Jason Derulo</u> and Bryan was released on June 7, 2014.

475 George Strait- Write This Down

released in March 1999 as the second single from Strait's album <u>Always Never the Same</u>. It was Strait's 35th number one single. It is a live video, filmed at his concert at <u>Raymond James Stadium</u> in Tampa, Florida and premiered in mid-1999.

474 Brooks & Dunn- That Ain't No Way To Go

released in March 1994 the fifth and final single from their album <u>Hard Workin' Man</u>. The song reached the top of the <u>Billboard Hot Country Singles & Tracks</u> chart. and becoming the duo's sixth Number One single.

473 Marty Robbins- El Paso City

released in March 1976 as the first single and title track from the album *El Paso City*. The song was Robbins' 15th number one on the U.S. country singles chart and his first since "My Woman, My Woman, My Wife" six years earlier. Robbins wrote "El Paso City" while flying over *El Paso*, Texas, in - he reported - the same amount of time it takes to sing, four minutes and 14 seconds. It was only the second time that ever happened to him; the first time was when he composed the original El Paso as fast as he could write it down.

472 Kenny Chesney- Never Wanted Nothing More

released in June 2007 as the first single from Chesney's 2007 album <u>Just Who I Am: Poets</u> <u>& Pirates</u>. To date, it is his fastest-climbing number one single,

471 Martina McBride- Wild Angels

released in November 1995 as the second single and title track from McBride's <u>album of the same name</u>. The song reached number one giving McBride her first number one single on that chart. McBride's daughter, Delaney, who was a baby at the time, can be heard laughing in the song's intro.

470 Mel Tillis- Coca Cola Cowboy

released in June 1979 as the first single from the album *Mr. Entertainer*. The song was featured in the film, *Every Which Way but Loose*, starring <u>Clint Eastwood</u> and the film *Bandit Goes Country* (which also had Tillis in the film) starring Brian Bloom. It was Tillis' fifth number

one on the U.S. country singles chart,

469 Blake Shelton- Some Beach

released in July 2004 as the second single from Shelton's 2004 album <u>Blake Shelton's Barn</u> & <u>Grill</u>. The song became Shelton's third number one hit.

468 Ronnie Milsap- Pure Love

the song which also marked the first country chart-topping single by its writer, Eddie Rabbitt, It was released in March 1974 as the first single and title track from the album Pure Love. The song was Milsap's first No. 1 hit on the Billboard Hot Country Singles chart in the late spring of the year.

467 Dwight Yoakam- A Thousand Miles from Nowhere

released in June 1993 as the second single from his album <u>This Time</u>. Like his previous single, this song peaked at number 2. The song was featured in two films, <u>Red Rock</u> West and Chasers.

466 Eric Church- Talladega

released in September 2014 as the fourth single from his 2014 album <u>The Outsiders</u>. Church took inspiration from watching a <u>NASCAR</u> race on television, but both he and co-writer <u>Luke Laird</u> said that the song is not really about racing. Rather, Church said that the race and the song represents "that experience, whatever that is: the experience with the person next to you, and knowing that that's probably a finite time in your life. It's not gonna last forever."

465 Linda Ronstadt- Silver Threads and Golden Needles

first recorded by <u>Wanda Jackson</u> in 1956. <u>Linda Ronstadt</u> recorded and released two versions of the song: the first, on her 1969 solo debut album <u>Hand Sown ... Home Grown</u>; the second, a country-pop crossover version for her 1973 <u>Don't Cry Now</u> album.

464 Justin Moore- Til My Last Day

released in March 2012 as the third and final single from his second studio album <u>Outlaws</u> <u>Like Me</u> (2011). Moore co-wrote the song with Brian Dean Maher and <u>Jeremy Stover</u>, who also produced the song. peaked at number one on the <u>Billboard Country Airplay</u> chart, giving Moore his first number-one hit on that chart and his third country chart topper overall.

463 Anne Murray- Could I Have This Dance

It was used in the 1980 film <u>Urban Cowboy</u> and appeared on both the <u>Urban Cowboy soundtrack album</u> for that film, as well as on the <u>Anne Murray's Greatest Hits</u> compilation album. became Murray's fifth number one country hit as a solo artist.

462 Lady Antebellum- American Honey

released on January 11, 2010, as the second single from their second album <u>Need You Now.</u> The group's fifth single overall, The song's female narrator, lead singer <u>Hillary Scott</u>, states a desire to escape her adult lifestyle and return to her childhood, which is described in the lyrics as "American honey."

461 Willie Nelson- Help Me Make It Through the Night

written and composed by <u>Kris Kristofferson</u> and released on his 1970 album <u>Kristofferson</u>. In 1980, <u>Willie Nelson</u> covered the song. His rendition became a hit on the country music charts of both the U.S. and Canada.

460 Jason Aldean- Fly Over States

released in February 2012 as the fifth and final single from his 2010 album <u>My Kinda</u>

Party and the fifteenth one of his career. In May 2012, it became his seventh number one hit as

well as his fourteenth top 10 hit and his ninth consecutive top 5.

459 Patty Loveless- Blame It on Your Heart

released in April 1993 as the first single from her album <u>Only What I Feel</u>. A cover version by <u>Deborah Allen</u> was featured prominently in the 1993 film <u>The Thing Called Love</u>.

458 Brad Paisley- This Is Country Music

Paisley released the song in December 2010. The song is Paisley's twenty-eighth single release overall; Paisley debuted the song at the <u>Country Music Association</u> (CMA) awards show on November 10, 2010. At the time, he had not recorded a studio version of the song and said that the CMA performance would be like a <u>demo</u>;

457 Dolly Parton-Jolene

It was released on October 15, 1973, by <u>RCA Victor</u>, as the first single and title track from her album <u>of the same name</u>. During an interview on <u>The Bobby Bones Show</u> in 2018, Dolly Parton revealed that she wrote "Jolene" on the same day that she wrote "<u>I Will Always Love</u> You". The song became Parton's second solo number-one single on the country charts

456 Heartland- I Loved Her First

released in June 2006 as the first single title track from their debut studio album <u>I Loved Her</u> <u>First</u> (2006). The song reached Number One. The song is a signature Father-Daughter song to dance to at wedding receptions for numerous brides and their fathers.

455 Don Williams- I Believe In You

released in August 1980 as the first single and title track from the album *I Believe in You*. The song was Williams' eleventh number 1 on Billboard's country chart.

454 Hank Williams- Move It On Over

written and recorded in 1947. The song is considered one of the earliest examples of <u>rock</u> and <u>roll</u> music. Though many claim the song, "<u>Rock Around the Clock</u>," released in 1954 by <u>Bill Haley & His Comets</u>, was the first <u>rock and roll</u> single,

453 Rascal Flatts- These Days

released in June 2002 as the first single from the band's 2002 album <u>Melt</u>. The song became their first number one hit. <u>Gary LeVox</u> said of the song, "We knew this was a special song. We'd already completed the album but we dropped a song that we wrote to put this on our album."

452 Alabama- Take Me Down

released in May 1982 as the second single from Alabama's album <u>Mountain Music</u>. Written by <u>Exile</u> band members <u>Mark Gray</u> and <u>J.P. Pennington</u>, the song was originally recorded by Exile in 1980. it was the group's seventh number one on the country chart

451 Miranda Lambert- Over You

written by Miranda Lambert and <u>Blake Shelton</u> about a personal experience Shelton had as a teenager when his older brother was killed in a car accident. released in January 2012 as the second single from Lambert's album <u>Four the Record</u>. Lambert and <u>Blake Shelton</u> won the <u>CMA Award</u> for Song of the Year, in addition, on April 7, 2013, they also won the <u>ACM Award</u> for Song of the Year

450 John Conlee- Backside Of Thirty

released in February 1979 as the third single from the album *Rose Colored Glasses*. The song was Conlee's third country hit and second number one on the country chart.

449 Kenny Chesney- Summertime

released in April 2006 as the third single from Chesney's 2005 album <u>The Road and the Radio</u>. The song reached number one. Co-writer Craig Wiseman told *The Boot* that he and McEwan had been working on "My Old Friend" for <u>Tim McGraw</u> until he took a break from writing and went out on the back steps of his office. Wiseman said, "It was that first night when it stays warm, and you can smell the grass growing. I walked outside and was like, 'Man ... summertime! Smell that!'

448 Restless Heart- Why Does It Have To Be (Wrong or Right)

released in April 1987 as the third single from the album, *Wheels*. The song was Restless Heart's third number one song

447 George Strait- Carrying Your Love With Me

released in May 1997 as the second single and title track from his <u>album of the same name</u>. The song reached the top of the chart. was nominated for <u>Best Male Country Vocal</u> Performance at the 1998 Grammy Awards.

446 Lee Brice- I Drive Your Truck

released in December 2012 as the third single from his album <u>Hard 2 Love</u>. Co-writer Connie Harrington was inspired to write it after hearing an interview on <u>Here and Now</u> with a father, Paul Monti, whose son, Medal of Honor recipient <u>Jared</u>, was killed in Afghanistan while trying to save a fellow soldier. In the interview, he states that he drives the truck to feel close to his son.

445 Tom T. Hall- Faster Horses (The Cowboy & The Poet)

released in December 1975 as the second single from the album, *Faster Horses*. Members of the <u>Western Writers of America</u> chose it as one of the Top 100 Western songs of all time. The song was Hall's final number one on the *Billboard* Hot Country Singles chart,

444 Luke Bryan- I Don't Want This Night To End

released in September 2011 as the second single from his album <u>Tailgates & Tanlines</u>. Bryan told *The Boot* that the song is about "a guy meeting a girl, and it's the first night that they're hanging out. It's a magical night and he doesn't want it to end. It's got a big fun chorus in it."

443 Joe Diffie- Pickup Man

released in October 1994 as the second single from the album <u>Third Rock from the Sun</u>. The song was his longest-lasting Number One hit, having spent four weeks at Number One. In 2005, a rewritten version of "Pickup Man" was used in television commercials for the restaurant chain <u>Applebee's</u>, to promote their "Carside To Go" service.

442 Crystal Gayle- Don't It Make My Brown Eyes Blue

released in June 1977 as the first single from Gayle's album <u>We Must Believe in Magic</u>. The song became a worldwide hit single. In the United States, it topped the <u>Billboard country music chart</u> for four weeks, and was Gayle's first (and biggest) crossover pop hit, reaching number 2 on the <u>Billboard Hot 100</u> for three weeks, the song won Gayle a <u>Grammy Award</u> for <u>Best Female Country Vocal Performance</u>.

441 Tim McGraw- My Next Thirty Years

written by <u>Phil Vassar</u> and recorded by American <u>country music</u> artist <u>Tim McGraw</u>. It was released in July 2000 as the fifth and final single from McGraw's album <u>A Place in the Sun</u>. The song reached number one.

440 Tracy Lawrence- Time Marches On

released in March 1996 as the second single and title track from his album <u>Time Marches</u> <u>On</u>. It was the 15th chart single of his career. It spent three weeks at Number One, becoming the

longest-lasting Number One hit of his career. It also received a Single of the Year nomination from the Country Music Association in 1996, as well as a Song of the Year nomination for both 1996 and 1997.

439 Henson Cargill- Skip A Rope

released in November 1967 as the first single and title track from the album *Skip a Rope*. The song was Cargill's debut release on the country charts and his most successful single. "Skip a Rope" was Cargill's sole No. 1. The song asked listeners to pay attention to what children would say as they played. It touched on, among other things, verbal <u>spousal abuse</u>, <u>tax evasion</u> and <u>racism</u>, and at the end, laid blame for what the children said directly at the feet of their parents.

438 Brad Paisley- Ticks

released in March 2007 as the first single from his 2007 album <u>5th Gear</u>. The song reached number one. Paisley was inspired to write the song from experience working on a farm. "Working out here on the farm, I literally have to check for ticks every time I come in from the woods or the fields," he notes.

437 Alan Jackson- Tall Tall Trees

co-written by American singers <u>George Jones</u> and <u>Roger Miller</u>. Both singers recorded their own versions: However, it was not until October 1995 that the song was released as a single, by <u>Alan Jackson</u>, as one of the newly recorded tracks for his 1995 compilation album <u>The</u> <u>Greatest Hits Collection.[4]</u> Jackson's cover was his eleventh Number One hit

436 Lefty Frizzell- If You've Got the Money I've Got the Time

The song is the second song recorded by Lefty Frizzell during his first session with <u>Columbia</u> <u>Records</u> in July 1950. The song rose to number one.

435 Josh Turner- Would You Go With Me

released in April 2006 as the second single from his album <u>Your Man</u>. It was his second number 1 country single in a row after "<u>Your Man</u>" peaked at the top on the <u>Billboard Country</u> chart in early 2006. Turner received a Grammy nomination for <u>Male Country Vocal Performance of the Year</u> for "Would You Go with Me." He also earned a nomination for Country Album of the Year for *Your Man*

434 Collin Raye- Love, Me

released in 1991 as the second single from the album <u>All I Can Be</u>. In January 1992, the single became Raye's first Number One single. the song received a Song of the Year nomination from the <u>Country Music Association</u>. The single has been cited as a popular choice for funerals.

433 Little Big Town- Pontoon

released in April 2012 as the first single from their fifth studio album, <u>Tornado</u>.^[1] The song became the group's first No. 1 single. The song won the <u>2013 Grammy Award</u> for <u>Best Country Duo/Group Performance</u>. Laird said that the idea for "Pontoon" came about when a publisher asked about a song that he and Hemby wrote for <u>Miranda Lambert</u> called "Fine Tune", but the publisher thought that it was called "Pontoon". After Hemby corrected him, the two thought that they should write a song called "Pontoon".

432 Mickey Gilley- Don't The Girls All Get Prettier At Closing Time

released in January 1976 as the first single from the album *Gilley's Smokin*. The song was Gilley's fifth No. 1. It caught the attention of <u>social psychologists</u> who used scientific testing to investigate whether individuals begin to perceive the opposite gender as being more attractive as it gets later into the night. The phenomenon became known as the "<u>closing time effect</u>".

431 Sawyer Brown- Some Girls Do

released in March 1992 as the second (third if "The Walk" is counted) single from their album *The Dirt Road*. It was a number-one hit.

430 Diamond Rio-Beautiful Mess

released in April 2002 as the first single from Diamond Rio's album *Completely*. ^[2] The song reached Number One.

429 Merle Haggard-That's the Way Love Goes

was released on November 1983 from his album, *That's The Way Love Goes*. His version became his 30th number 1 hit single. Merle won a Grammy Award for Best Male Country Vocal Performance.

428 Tim McGraw- Down On The Farm

released in July 1994 as the third single from McGraw's 1994 album <u>Not a Moment Too</u> Soon. The song peaked at number 2.

427 Zac Brown Band- Homegrown

released on January 12, 2015 and is the first single from the band's fourth studio album *Jekyll* + *Hyde*, becoming the band's 11th number one

426 Kip Moore- Somethin' 'Bout A Truck

released in September 2011 as the first single from his debut album <u>Up All Night. 111</u> Moore wrote this song with and Dan Couch. reached number one on the <u>Billboard Hot Country</u> <u>Songs</u> chart, the only single in Moore's career to reach that peak to date.

425 Tom T. Hall- I Like Beer

released in August 1975 as the lead single from the album, *I Wrote a Song About It*. The song peaked at number 4 on the U.S. country singles chart.

424 Vince Gill- One More Last Chance

released in July 1993 as the fourth single from his album, <u>I Still Believe in You</u>. The song reached the top. The video features a cameo by <u>George Jones</u>, who appears at the end of the video riding a John Deere <u>riding mower</u> to the golf course. The appearance echoes earlier incidents in Jones's life where he would ride his lawnmowers to go on beer runs because his wives would not let him drive a car.

423 Brooks & Dunn- Red Dirt Road

released in April 2003 as the first single and title track from their album <u>Red Dirt Road</u>. The song reached the top of the <u>Billboard Hot Country Songs</u> chart. In 2019, Brooks & Dunn rerecorded "Red Dirt Road" with American country music artist <u>Cody Johnson</u> for their album <u>Reboot</u>.

422 Dottie West-Country Sunshine

remembered both as one of West's biggest chart hits, and also as the jingle from a classic Coca-Cola television ad: "Country Sunshine" was released September 1973 as the first single from West's Country Sunshine album. had originally been prepared as a jingle for a TV commercial for Coca-Cola, McCann-Erickson Advertising who'd been responsible for the classic Coca-Cola jingles "I'd Like to Teach the World to Sing (In Perfect Harmony)", "It's the Real Thing", and "Things Go Better With Coke".

421 Randy Houser- How Country Feels

released in May 2012 as the first single and title track from Houser's album of the same name. became Houser's first Number One country hit.

420 Randy Travis- I Told You So

It reached number one on the U.S. <u>Billboard</u> and Canadian <u>RPM</u> country singles charts in June 1988. Travis had first recorded it on his 1983 album *Live at the Nashville Palace* under his stage name "Randy Ray". It became a local hit and one of his most requested songs at the club.

419 Chris Young- Aw Naw

released in May 2013 as the first single from his fourth studio album, A.M.

418 Loretta Lynn- One's On The Way

Originally released in <u>1971</u>, the song was the title track to her 1971 album and became one of her best-known hits.

417 Lady Antebellum- I Run To You

released on January 26, 2009, as the third and final single from the group's <u>self-titled debut album</u>. the group's first number-one single, reaching that peak in July 2009, The song won the 2009 CMA Single of the Year Award on November 11, 2009. It won the <u>Grammy Award</u> for <u>Best Country Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocal</u> and was also nominated for a <u>Grammy Award for Best Country Song</u> on December 2, 2009, to but lost to <u>Taylor Swift</u>'s "White Horse".

416 Conway Twitty- That's My Job

released in November 1987 as the third single from the album <u>Borderline</u>. The song reached #6.

415 Tim McGraw- I Like It I Love It

released in July 1995 as the first single from his album <u>All I Want</u>. The song is McGraw's ninth single overall, and it became his third number-one single. A version of the song was made for the <u>NHL</u>'s <u>Nashville Predators</u>

414 Miranda Lambert- Mama's Broken Heart

released on January 14, 2013 as the fourth single from Lambert's album, *Four the Record*. peaked at number 2

413 Hank Snow- I'm Movin' On

reached #1 on the *Billboard* country singles chart and stayed there for 21 weeks, tying a record for the most weeks atop the chart. It was the first of seven number-one *Billboard* country hits Snow scored throughout his career on that chart. The song's success led to Snow joining the <u>Grand Ole Opry</u> cast in 1950.

412 Rodney Atkins- Farmer's Daughter

released in March 2010 as the fourth single from his album <u>It's America</u>, available in June 2010 as a bonus track from the album's re-issue. The song is also included as an album cut on his 2011 album <u>Take a Back Road</u>.

411 Dwight Yoakam- Crazy Little Thing Called Love

a song by the British <u>rock</u> band <u>Queen</u>. Written by <u>Freddie Mercury</u> in 1979, <u>Dwight</u> <u>Yoakam</u> included a cover of the song on his 1999 album <u>Last Chance for a Thousand Years:</u> <u>Dwight Yoakam's Greatest Hits from the 90's</u>. Yoakam's version was released as a single. It debuted at number 65 on the US <u>Billboard</u> "Hot Country Singles & Tracks" chart for the week of 1 May 1999, and peaked at number 12 on the US country singles charts that year. It was also used in a television commercial for clothing retailer <u>Gap</u> at the time of the album's release.

410 George Jones- Love Bug

a single by American <u>country music</u> artist <u>George Jones</u>. Jones' version, which also features a young <u>Johnny Paycheck</u> on backup vocals. <u>George Strait</u> released a cover of the song in February 1994 as the third single from his album <u>Easy Come</u>, <u>Easy Go</u>. Strait's version reached #8

409 Kenny Chesney- Come Over

released in May 2012 as the second single from Chesney's 2012 album <u>Welcome to the Fishbowl</u>. became Chesney's twenty-second number one single

408 Merle Haggard- The Bottle Let Me Down

released in August 1966 as the second single from the album <u>Swinging Doors</u>. The song peaked at number three

407 Alison Krauss- When You Say Nothing At All

Keith Whitley, who took it to the top of the <u>Billboard Hot Country Singles</u> chart on December 24, 1988; <u>Alison Krauss</u>, whose version was her first solo top-10 country hit in 1995; Krauss' recording won the 1995 CMA award for "Single of the Year".

406 Blake Shelton-Ol' Red

The song was originally recorded by <u>George Jones</u> on his 1990 album <u>You Oughta Be Here</u> <u>with Me</u> and covered by <u>Kenny Rogers</u> on his 1993 album <u>If Only My Heart Had a Voice</u>. It was later recorded by <u>Blake Shelton</u>, and his version of the song was released in March 2002 as the third and final single from his self-titled debut album. Shelton's rendition was also a Top 20 hit

405 Buck Owens- Love's Gonna Live Here

The single would be Buck Owens' second number one on the country charts.

404 Carrie Underwood- Before He Cheats

the third wide-release single from Carrie Underwood's debut studio album, Some Hearts (2005). It was the fifth release from the album overall. The song became an enormous Crossover success, topping the Billboard Hot Country Songs chart for five consecutive weeks, reaching the top five on the Billboard Adult Top 40 chart, and becoming a top ten hit on the Billboard Mainstream Top 40 and Adult Contemporary charts. "Before He Cheats" became the first ever country song to sell over two million digitally and was once the best-selling country song of all time.

403 Kenny Rogers- You Decorated My Life

released in September 1979 as the lead single from his album <u>Kenny</u>. It was a number-one hit

402 Dolly Parton- Here You Come Again

released as a single in September 1977 as the title track from Parton's album of the same name, topped the U.S. country singles chart for five weeks, and won the 1978 Grammy award for Best Female Country Vocal Performance;

401 Thomas Rhett- Get Me Some of That

released in November 2013 as the fourth single from his debut album, It Goes Like This.
